Rich Von Allmen's 1933 Plymouth Rumble Seat Coupe

Some of Rich Von Allmen's favorite memories are the many miles he spent as a teenager riding in his uncle Rudy's 1933 rumble seat coupe. Rich also remembers as a child riding in the rumble seat as his dad drove to Seaside. When it got too cold riding back there Rich's sister took his place in the open air.

Many years later Rich's uncle Herman purchased the entire estate of uncle Rudy. In September of 1987 Rich purchased that same 1933 Plymouth coupe from Herman. The car had been stored in the basement garage of one of Rudy's buildings in southeast Portland for many years. The license plate still had 1954 tags.

Rich spent several years

working on the car and in May of 1990 he had the old engine running. Shortly after, the Von Allmens purchased the property that had originally belonged to Uncle Rudy including the building where the coupe had been stored all those years. That same building has since been remodeled into a beautiful home. With all the work that had to be done, landscaping and remodeling, the Plymouth re-

storing project had to be put aside.

In October of 2000 Rich turned the Plymouth project over to Custom Automotive Restorations of Portland. The car is being restored body wise to as close to original as possible, but with modern running gear.

Rich will have many more enjoyable memories when his 33 is completed this summer.

March Guest Speaker Troy House

The guest speaker at the March 26th membership meeting was our own local member, Troy House. Troy started working for Chrysler and Chrysler dealers in 1953. Troy has since retired, but that hasn't stopped him from working on old cars.

Mr. House started his presentation with a discussion of the origination of the internal combustion engine. It started in Germany by some fellows named Daimler and Otto.

Troy used the analogy of comparing an engine operating to the human body. For both to work efficiently you need several factors to operate properly. They are, an air supply, fuel in the proper amount, electricity, and circulation.

One of Troy's recommendations was for those working on their own vehicles to invest in some simple diagnostic equipment. For owners of 6 volt cars he reminded them to use a heavier battery cable than those for the 12 volt systems.

Before long, his dissertation turn into a question and answer session as different members sought to utilize Troy's many years of experience with older Mopar engines. Questions relating to ignition and carburation drew the most interest. It seems everyone came away with a little more knowl-

Troy left us with one more bit of sage advice, referring back to his human body/automobile analogy "don't let your exhaust pipe get clogged".

Troy House was born in Raymondville Missouri in 1927. He spent early years growing up on a large cattle ranch in Dorley, Montana. He became a smoke jumper and entered the 2nd War then in the late 40's. Troy worked in construction in Alaska, where he further trained to be a master mechanic. For the past 45 years Troy worked for Chrysler Corp as Master Mechanic.

National Plymouth Club East-West Tour, Keep July of 2003 open on your calendars.

East-West tour committee member, Tom Nachand spoke for his committee at the March meeting. He has started working on the club's portion of the tour's final

Our club will be responsible for the longest and probably most difficult section of the tour's journey from the Atlantic Ocean to our Pacific coast.

Tom's first task is to determine a route that begins at Yellowstone in Wyoming, travels across Idaho and on through Oregon or possibly through parts of Washington.

Of great importance is the first part, leaving Yellowstone. There are several options, going north into Montana and then west to eastern Washington and then south to the Columbia Gorge and on to western Oregon. A second option is to go south and into the lower part of Idaho, to I-80 and into eastern Oregon either to the Gorge or across the middle of the state, perhaps through Bend. There are several possibilities if this option is chosen.

Some of the considerations Tom's committee will need to address are the number of participants and the age and reliability of their vehicles. Much of the trip will be on mountainous terrain, which could be a hardship for the older small engine cars. Much of southern Idaho is desert like, putting a strain on cooling systems in the hot summer weather.

The large distance between towns could present a problem for refueling. Locating food outlets, restrooms, and towing or other services will be essential for a safe and pleasant experience for our eastern guests.

Some of the unknown factors might be, how much time is available to the drivers to get across this entire segment, how much time will they want to spend taking side trips or stopping at various sites and locations? As we know from living here, there is

always something to look at, no matter where you are.

Tom has been exploring different sources for information and will keep us posted on his

committee's progress.

Frank and Linda Anthony 1933 Plymouth Coupe

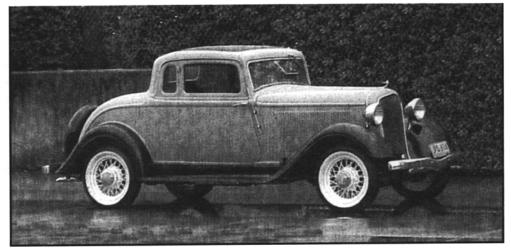
When Frank Anthony was eight or nine years old in the fifties, he would play in his grandfather's dark blue 34 Plvmouth coupe and pretend it was his.

Several years ago, Tom was paging through a national car magazine and spotted a thumb sized picture of a stock 1933 P D Coupe. Having enjoyed '30's coupes of all makes throughout his driving career, he liked the styling but knew next to nothing about early Plymouths.

Years earlier he had owned a daily driver '39 Chrysler Royal Coupe and in one of life's errors traded it straight across for a beautiful 1923 Model T. That marriage lasted four years and

fifty miles.

Not wanting to duplicate the primitiveness of the Model T, Tom investigated the reliability/ road worthiness of the 1933 Plymouths and found that early Plymouth engineering was significantly ahead of its time when compared to the competition. Standard hydraulic brakes, hardened rod bearings, and "Floating Power" rubber motor mounts jumped out in the research. The long history

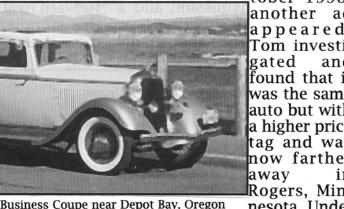

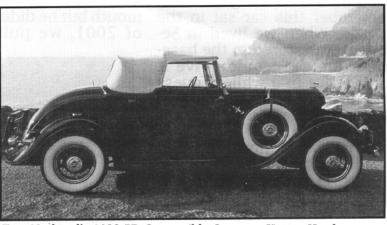


Dan Eaton's 1933 PD Business Coupe near Depot Bay, Oregon

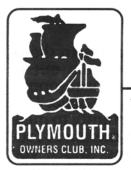
