Bob lives in Langley, Canada, a town about 30 miles north of Vancouver, Canada.

Back in 1958, when he was 16 Bob bought his first Plymouth. It was a 1947 Plymouth Convertible. It was his daily driver, driving it to high school and work for several years until he traded it for another convertible, a 1948 Plymouth. Four years had past since Bob sold his '47, one day he came across it and saw it was not being taken care. He decided he would try and buy it back, so he left a note on the windshield of the '47. owner called him back and sold it back to him. Bob still has the '47 and it is on his list to fix up again, when he gets the time.

As they do, the years few by and Bob was looking for another Plymouth Convertible. Bob was looking in the Hemmings magazine and located a '48 Convertible in Loveland, Colorado.

There are not many that are rust free in Canada. This one had 60,000 original miles and was rust free. After some investigating Bob got on a plane and flew to Colorado to see the '48 convertible.

When he got there the owner was about to leave town for Kansas with some other cars the next morning. The owner gave him a hard time over the price, but when Bob placed the hard

cash on the hood the sale was made. The '48 had the original wire wheels and the owner did not want to sell them with the car. Bob had planned to drive the '48 back to Canada. After some negotiating he paid \$1,000.00 for the wheels.

The engine of the '48 had just been rebuilt and had only 3 miles on it. The owner tried to talk Bob out of driving back to Canada, but Bob drove it back without any problems.

The '48 is a "mint" as Bob explains, although he thinks it was painted in 1967.

Bob has the '48 in the shop right now, it is getting a new Hearts - "Stay Fast" canvas top.

He has 83,000 miles on it now, put on mainly driving to car shows and Sunday on mornings.

Bob also has a 1964 Sport Fury Convertible, which he also found when he was looking in Hemmings magazine in 1991.

The '64 was purchased from a man in Manatoba, Canada. The '64 convertible, was stored in a garage in Calagary, Alberta; Bob thinks in originally came out of Missoula, Montana.

The man advertised the '64 for \$27,000.00 U.S. dollars (underlined). Bob and one of his sons drove to see the car, but didn't have \$27,000.00. He had just sold a auto business and that was all he had. Some how Bob struck a deal and the Fury and it was his.

The Fury is Black with a White Top, it still has the original interior. With only 55,000 miles the '64 is as Bob says, "bone dead stock".


State Parks employees escort the old cars through the tunnels and allow many stops for photo opportunities. The Park Rangers were so gracious and even offered to take pictures with your camera.

Minutes of Regular meeting of the Board of Directors, CPPC Inc.

The Board of Directors of Cascade Pacific Plymouth® Club, Inc. met September 17, 2002 at approximately 7:00pm at Bill's Hobby Shop, 6201 SE Lake Rd. Milwaukie, Oregon.

Present at the meeting were the following Board members: Bill Call, Allen Tiffany, Duanne Luckow, Clare Rogers and Jeff Jolly. Also present at the Board meeting were Club President Steve Heaton, Club Vicepresident Scott Farnsworth, Club Treasurer Dennis Rice and Club Secretary Vicki Williams.

Jeff Jolly, Board Chairman presided over the meeting.

Mike Bade handed out the new membership rosters for the Boards approval. Some corrections were made and the Board approved the distribution of the roster with the noted changes.

Mike Bade also handed out a flyer he prepared for ordering of T-shirts, polo shirts and sweatshirts. He had sample sweatshirts to display. The Board felt that he was not charging enough for his shirts but Mike felt the charges were adequate.

Steve Heaton reported that he had provided Mike with some flag material and Mike would experiment on placing the logo on the material in order to have flags made for group cruises.

Mitch Wall handed out the revised language for the change to article 4.8 of the bylaws. Allen Tiffany moved the new language be accepted and Duanne Luckow seconded the motion and it was agreed that the new language be effective as of August 20th when it was proposed to the general membership. Mitch agreed to incorporate the new language into a new set of bylaws.

Mike Bade made a request to purchase a special stapler for the newsletter and membership rosters. It would cost \$80.00 but would be more efficient in preparing those documents. He reported that he was now employed by Portland Public Schools and would have access to a folding machine. Bill Call moved that the Club purchase the stapler and Allen Tiffany seconded the motion.

The board discussed the purchase of chenille patches for the club to have on hand to sell. It was decided that club members could order the patches individually and the club would not make the investment to have 24 patches on hand. Larry Catt would be asked to request a refund of the initial money paid to the patch vendor prior to the price increase.

The status of the selection of next year's officers was reported on by Bill Call. He stated that Scott Farnsworth had agreed to be nominated as President, Dolores Call had agreed to be nominated as Treasurer and Duanne Luckow agreed to be nominated as Vicepresident, much to his surprise. The nomination of Secretary was still unfilled. Upon much arm-twisting, Vicki Williams agreed to be nominated as Secretary. There was also a need for a nomination of a member at large to serve on the Board. Jeff Jolly agreed to accept the nomination for that position. It was also suggested that at the September membership meeting that the bylaws be read regarding accepting nominations from the general membership and that the October newsletter should also remind the members

of this option. Mitch Wall also suggested that the officers begin cultivating potential officers for 2003 and invited those people to board meetings so they get a feel for the responsibility. The board then voted to accept the nominating committee's nominations.

It was decided that the bylaws should be a part of the membership roster. Since there would be a new slate of officers for 2003, it was decided to include the by-laws with the new membership roster to be printed and distributed early 2003. The current roster would be distributed without the by-laws attached. Mike Bade thought he could probably insert the new membership roster with the newsletter.

It was agreed that Vicki Williams would omit the breakdown of members versus associates and others in the copy of the minutes submitted to the newsletter editor. That way when the national editor reports club information in the Plymouth Bulletin it would reflect the total number of people attending the meeting. The minutes would still reflect the breakdown for quorum purposes.

The September Garage Tour will most like be an October Garage Tour. No date has been set but Duanne will know more and report such at the September membership meeting.

Scott Farnsworth agreed to take a table to the show at Pearson's air park on Saturday, September 21st. Bill Call agreed to gather pictures, applications and the small banner to hang from the table. Vicki Williams agreed to get the club scrapbook to Bill Call before Saturday.

Mitch Wall expressed some concern about the club doing business out of the State of Oregon. Bill Call agreed to contact the club's insurance carrier to make sure there isn't any impact on the insurance policy coverage when not in Oregon. Mitch also suggested someone sit down with the insurance carrier once a year to go over events and activities so that the carrier is aware of the club's actions.

Allen Tiffany donated two radios for the club to use when on tours. His only stipulation was if he needed them for a large job he would borrow them back. Now, when on a group tour the lead car and the rear car can communicate.

Under new business Mike Bade suggested that a summary of the Board of Director meetings be included in the newsletter so that club members can see what actions the board is taking and what business the board deals with. Bill Call stated we needed to remind the membership that everyone is welcome at the Board Meetings.
