

technical talk FTHE HOOK from CPPC

"Many ways you can waste money on your car!"

(Part 1 of several) By Phil Lapin / Technical Committee Coordinator

Most people would like to keep the "operating costs" of their vehicle to a minimum - essentially walking a line between the extremes of obsession and neglect. To achieve this goal, you can educate yourself as best you can about your car, or ask others about your car but only those who you trust. With older vehicles, the Technical Committee can help you with this situation.

- 1) Premium or regular gas? Use the least expensive gasoline that doesn't make your car knock. Higher performance and higher compression engines may need premium fuel - but many cars do not. So don't feed your vehicle any more octanes than it needs! If you experience some mild knocking or irregularities, first try changing to another brand of fuel. There really are differences between brands in what are supposed to be the same octane ratings.
- 2) Oil changes. First and most important, if your car is under warranty, stick with the factory requirements. Voiding a warranty is NOT a good thing!

Outside of warranty engines should still stay in a reasonable range of oil change intervals. Usually, the TYPE of use your vehicle gets is the most important factor. If you live in a colder climate, take mostly very short trips, tow a trailer, or have a high revving / high performance engine - your oil changes should be more frequent. Once again, use the manufacturer recommendations as a guide here and be conservative. If you drive only on smooth trips

not stressing your engine, or your car sits for long intervals, go more by a calendar (not odometer) schedule for oil changes - changing oil at least twice per calendar

Regarding natural versus synthetic oils, the debate over these has raged for years. Synthetic oils cost considerably more - especially in oil change businesses. If your car manufacturer doesn't specify synthetic, you are most likely wasting money using it.

3) Dealer versus Factory Maintenance Schedules. Dealer service departments will sometimes "recommend" that services be done more frequently than the factory schedule. This may be based upon some minor - or extremely minor - issue that can tend to intimidate the customer. Tune-ups, routine engine maintenance (spark plugs, timing belts, coolant and so forth) are best performed on the manufacturer schedules in your owner manual - not the dealer recommendations!
